This month in the Children's Tower we have started a new session of our 'Tween the Pages book club, geared towards 4th through 7th graders. This time around it's dragons. The book pic for Dragon Book Club is the first in the Wings of Fire Graphic Novel Series: The Dragonet Prophecy. We are getting very detailed in our creative endeavors for this club. We have started making dragon eggs with foam egg forms, silver thumbtacks, and metallic paints. These are still a work in progress, but when finished will be eye-catching for sure. We have three more weeks of this club and will continue to talk and make all things dragon-related, including what type of dragon each participant is--think personality quiz. We will also make leather bookmarks, stamping and hammering patterns onto the leather and adding glass dragon eyes.






In addition to our tween club, we have our new Makers Club starting on the 2nd Saturday of February: an arts and crafts club that aims at projects for kids ages 6 and above. I have yet to pick the exact project for our first club meeting, but some of the contenders include: Mandala-Dot Rock Painting, Pinecone printing on clay to make jewelry, and finally, Science Painting, which will use things like rubbing alcohol, table salt and bubbles to alter paint textures.

In addition, Bree and I have collaborated to make a Tiny Art Showcase here at the library. In February we will have times set aside for patrons and community members to work on their art at the library.

The community show for the tiny art pieces will be in March.

Lastly, I am excited to say that Library Yoga is a success. We have had two classes so far with positive feedback. It feels satisfying to be teaching yoga again and to help people stay integrated into the wholeness that is their mind/body/spirit.



February is Black History Month, a month in which we celebrate the culture, stories and experiences of our black community members and their families. The theme for this year's black history month is African Americans and the Arts. This is a great time to explore the library's collection to learn more about the contributions that have been made by Black artists and to elevate Black voices.

We'll be highlighting different authors throughout the month and sharing what titles are available in the library to inspire your reading this month. We have many to choose from on each of our floors, from Children's books to fiction and Poetry/ nonfiction.


To prepare for Black History Month, I did some research into Maine's history of Black artists, and found a wonderful article titled: Speak Out: "A State of Art: Maine's Influence on African-American Artists" written by: Leigh Donaldson and published in 2013 by the Art Times Journal. This article discusses visual art in Maine and influential artists. It highlights the struggles of these artists and their experience in Maine. Something I learned from this publication is that Skowhegan is the home of an art school that had a profound impact on African American artists. The Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture, as mentioned in the article "since 1946, has sustained summer residency programs where race posed no barrier to learning and creativity and African Americans have played a prominent role in its history and development."

The school's founder, Willard Cummings, mandated reaching out to black students to invite them to enroll in the school's art programs, offering scholarships to many. Among those who attended, as students or as guest artists, were: Romare Beardon, Elizabeth Catlett, Gregory Coates, David Driskell, Mel Edwards, David Hammons, bell hooks, Jacob Lawrence, Glen Ligon, Whitfield Lovell, Lorraine O'Grady, Howardena Pindell, Adrian Piper, Martin Puryear, Alison Saar, Betye Saar, Nari Ward, Carrie Mae Weems, and Fred Wilson.
