We always set up a table and visit with the folks from our community. Stop by and say hi if you get a chance. We'll be the one under the big banner that says "Skowhegan Free Public Library." See you there!

A few folks mentioned how interesting they found the library statistics I included in a recent Library Lookout. Here are a few more for you:

- Public and school libraries that are part of Overdrive's global network (the audio/e-book network the library is affiliated with) circulated 137 million e-books, digital audiobooks and other digital media in 2014.
- (This is) a 33% increase compared with 2013.
   The e-book circulation alone rose 32% to 105 million.
- Tablets and smartphones account for 62% of (these) visits (statistics from the Library Hotline, January 26<sup>th</sup> issue).

In Maine, for the period of July 2013 - June 2014 we had an Overdrive circulation of 333,769 checkouts. The previous year it was 197,304. (Janet McKenney, Director of Library Development, Maine State Library).

Rest easy, even though e-book usage is growing, the library still maintains a large and diverse collection of reading material. And with our interlibrary loan program, we're able to borrow about anything you'd like to read.

Even though February is the shortest calendar month, for me, it is the longest month of the year. At this point, I am sick of winter, sick of cold, sick of white and grav. sick of snow and longing for flip flops, flowers, and fair temperatures. That being said, February is always a month where I get excited about reading all over again. On Monday, February 2<sup>nd</sup> the Youth Media Awards take place. This is when they announce the Newbery, Caldecott, Coretta Scott King, and Printz Awards (along with others) for 2015. I call this the Youth Librarians' "Super Bowl" if you will. I come into work early with my coffee and a notepad and watch the live stream of the awards being announced. Sometimes, I am surprised and other times I am not, but I always end with a great list of books to both order for the library and add to my reading list. If you are looking for some wonderful books to read (or to have your kids read) the award winning books is always a good place to start. We have the previous Newbery Award winning books and the previous Caldecott Award winning books on display up here in the library. Come check them out.

As always, we are running our Stoytimes on every Wednesday, and Toddler Time programs on every 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Monday. Recently, I've gotten a few questions about what ages these programs are for. First off, we accept children of any age at any program unless otherwise noted; however, we do gear our programs toward certain ages. Our Wednesday morning Storytime is aimed towards preschooler-age children. We offer books, songs, and activities in which most 3-5 year olds can participate. Our Monday morning Toddler Times are for our littlest patrons (ages 12 months – 3 years old). For this program, we tend to keep with shorter stories, more movement and music. manipulatives, and simple projects or crafts.

We invite you to bring your children to either program and check them out. It's a great way to beat cabin fever with the little ones!
