It is conference season here in the library world, and you may have noticed that the library was closed on the 25th and 26th of April - this was because staff was attending the annual Reading Roundup conference in Augusta and participating in some staff training on Narcan use / overdose reversal and prevention.

Our full-time staff are all now trained in Narcan use if necessary and while this is something we hope not to need to put to the test anytime soon, it is also something that we all felt was important to have some background in, just in case the need ever arises.



The Reading Roundup conference, a youth services focused event, was an opportunity for our librarians and volunteers to recharge with their colleagues from across the state, network with new people, get inspired by some amazing speakers, and gain insight into some of the challenges facing libraries, as well as bring home some new ideas for programming. While we are not all youth services librarians, we all work with children in some capacity - whether it be through family programs, STEM programs, etc. - and so this event is always incredibly valuable to the whole staff. We have one more conference next month that we will all be attending - the annual Maine Library Association conference - that is beneficial in much the same way. 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MEET GABRIELLE - OUR NEW YOUTH SERVICES LIBRARIAN!

What is your favorite book?

My favorite book? That question is too difficult. My favorite book, from what period in my life? I can say that there are certain books that I reread every few years, and that I have read since junior high or high school. I am a big sci-fi and fantasy reader, nerd, lover and so my stack of favorites is going to lean precariously in that direction. I remember getting to read Madeleine L'Engle's Time Quartet in junior high, as in A Wrinkle in Time. The fact that these kids were out there being super smart and having adventures in different dimensions and on alien planets intrigued me. I have read that series probably 4 or 5 times since then. Also A Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy was one of my favorites in High School. And again, how many times have I read that? I have bought and destroyed 2 copies. I also have a copy of Slaughterhouse 5 from the 60's that I bought used as a teenager. I have taped and retaped so many times that the exterior of the book is more tape than paper. Lastly, I have to mention Jane Eyre: not science fiction or fantasy, but there is such an element of the connection of higher spirit between Jane and Mr. Rochester, as to be metaphysical and magical. And Jane is a great hero and still feels modern and stands in her independence and power. I have read Jane Eyre at least 6 times...



What do you like to do in your free time?

I read. I sometimes have to NOT read, so that I get other tasks done. I am a momma too and like to have adventures with my kiddo. We love nature and the outdoors: hiking and walking. And I tend to bring the wilderness home in the form of disturbed patches of moss or the odd pretty pine cone, or some fresh needles from a balsam fir tree that may have fallen in a recent storm, because balsam fir smells like if a pine tree could be ice cream or bubble gum. And when I cannot be outside, I take care of too many houseplants. If I didn't work at the library, I was going to open a greenhouse. I practice Yoga. I write stories. I also paint. I have made art since I was a kid and tend to paint what people call "weird", but can also be called surreal or visionary themes. I like to paint faces and animals and flowers, but not in a traditional way; they come out looking more like strange dreams. Painting or drawing is what I do to feel better. It is medicine and joy and getting back to having a conversation with myself, at the heart of myself...or at least the best that I can be in the moment.


What drew you to working in a library? Was there ever a time when you had a particularly great library experience (here or elsewhere) that left a positive impression? AND/OR what does a library/library services mean to you?

I am combining these two questions, simply because they mash-up like a laser light show in my head. Beams of energy flying around all tied up and blending together. So I can say with some wonder and nostalgia, that my first job EVER was at a library at the age of 8. I was a library assistant for my elementary school as part of The Reach Program and I got to leave class once or twice a week and go to the school's library and shelve recently returned books. I have very specific memories of the school's copies of Charlie and the Glass Elevator, and a series on Greek Mythology that I think I ended up checking out intermittently after that throughout grade school. Now, if I think about libraries in general, I get excited! No, really! The artist in me loves libraries, especially with centuries old architecture and history wrapped around their collections of books. Just like this library in Skowhegan that I am sitting in right now. I mean, have you seen the Gargoyles on the fireplace downstairs?!? I also think about public spaces like this one that GIVE. Books give, libraries give, librarians give. A library gives people a place where it is safe to go. A library gives people a place where they can learn almost anything. A library can give anyone a place where it is possible to shift the thinnest sheet of paper and that delicate act transports you/me/us to a different solar system or to a point in time long forgotten, or gives information on how the human body works, or where in the world Ball Pythons are from. So a library, as it holds books, also holds so much potential and does so without judgement. And it is a place where one idea (from an author or illustrator) will open up and birth ideas into another person's mind and maybe, eventually onto another page somewhere that will turn into a new book. And the cycle continues...So what I am trying to say is that every library experience for me has been memorable, or at least has contributed to the very large and grande memorial that I have to libraries in my head and heart. Skowhegan Library stands there now, and has for some years, as the most recent library-love and as the actual visual of what the word library conjures up in my memory. This place is where my child and I have discovered books together, where we have shared in Storytimes, where I have discovered new authors and ideas and where I have taught yoga to a bunch of wiggly tots in the past. Now that I get to be here in my capacity as children's librarian, I feel privileged, excited and even a wee bit trepidatious to get to carry on traditions like Storytime and the Summer Reading Program, to order new books for our collection and to meet all of you, as you too make memories with the books that you read. After all it only takes 1 book, one really good, special, amazing book to make someone love to read.
