NATIONAL CONNECTIONS READING AND DISCUSSION PROGRAM

Adult literacy students will participate in a free reading and discussion series beginning on September 13, 1999, for the "National Connections" project hosted by the Skowhegan Free Public Library.

The Skowhegan Free Public Library is one of 40 libraries nationwide selected to participate in the project organized by the Vermont Council on the Humanities in partnership with the American Library Association, the Maine Humanities Council and the Somerset County Basic Skills Program. The project is funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The theme for the fall series is "biography". Participants will receive at no cost the following books: Eleanor Roosevelt, El Chino, Wilma Unlimited, Lincoln: A Photobiography, Wanted Dead or Alive (the story of Harriet Tubman), Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes, Teammates, and Ragtime Tumpie.

The group will meet four times, one month apart. Each 90-minute session involves a guided discussion of the books which students have read in advance with the help of tutors. During the discussions, the scholar leads the students to discover connections between books and their own lives, and to explore the larger theme of the series. Program participants keep the books for their own home libraries.

David Richards, Assistant Director of the Margaret Chase Smith Library, will be the project scholar.

The first session of "biography" will be held at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, September 13th, at the Skowhegan Free Public Library. To register or for more information please call 474-7553.
