We have decided to share our top reads of 2020. Quite often we get asked to recommend books to our patrons, so we decided to tell you about some of our favorites – these books would make great holiday gifts as well!



Bree's top picks for 2020

- One Last Lie by Paul Doiron
- The Guest List by Lucy Foley
- Ghosts of Harvard by Francesca Serritella
- Swashby and the Sea by Beth Ferry; illustrated by Juana Martinez-Neal

I will read anything with Paul Doiron's name on it. After eleven books and a handful of short stories, I am completely hooked. Mike Bowditch is such a complex character, you can count on being immersed into his world and finding yourself holding your breath, not knowing what'll happen next. One Last Lie is, without a doubt, my top pick for 2020. This mystery takes place in Maine, so that's a huge bonus for me, but it's also engaging, a "sit on the edge of your seat and ignore what's going on around you because you just need to know how it ends" type of bookThis book has it all; rugged wilderness, complex storylines, a touch of romance, and one mystery that inevitably leads to another. This would make a fantastic gift. If you haven't, you need to read this book; and the ten that came before it.

The Guest List takes place on a small, isolated island off the coast of Ireland so I knew it would be phenomenal. It is comprised of many different points of view, which I know can be irritating to readers, but trust me, it makes this story even better. The slow burning tension between the characters makes for an explosive ending. It's a psychological thriller with all the best elements forming together to create a one of a kind reading experience. The secluded setting combined with the many different personalities, and secrets, of the wedding party and guests create a huge network of interwoven lies that threaten to overtake the whole island.

Ghost stories are probably my favorite genre. There's just something about reading a spooky book when you're alone in your house and it's raining and you stop to listen because you think you heard something in the other room. **Ghosts of Harvard** is something a bit different from the typical haunted house though. It's filled with twists and turns, mental illness, the pressures of Harvard, loss, history, the paranormal, and the list just goes on and on. I'd suggest this to anyone who likes a book with a lot of depth and thought-provoking themes. The plot points all weave together beautifully in the end and I promise you, you won't see it coming. It's a chilling story you won't soon forget.

Swashby and the Sea pulled at my heartstrings and was such a beautiful children's story. There's an old sea captain, who loves the sea and peace and quiet, a charming, fun-loving little girl who unknowingly softens the old man's bristly exterior and the little girl's happy, bohemian-eques grandmother. From writing little messages in the sand to wishing on starfish, this story will engage little readers. The illustrations have a way of sweeping you into the story and you may even find yourself writing messages to the sea during your next visit to the beach.

Francoise's top picks of 2020

I'm not fond of love stories, but I like non-fiction novels or historical fiction novels based on real people. I recently read the **Tattooist of Auschwitz** by Heather Morris and the sequel of that book **Cilka's Journey**. It made me realize what people have to endure to survive and also made me feel guilty for complaining about something as silly as wearing a mask. I recommend these books to you all.

Miss Angie's top picks for 2020

- Stamped: Racism, Antiracism and You by Jason Reynolds
- Faith Taking Flight by Julie Murphy
- Here in the Real World by Pennypacker, Sara.
- A Polar Bear in the Snow by Mac Barnett and Shawn Harris

Without a doubt my very top choice for 2020 is **Stamped: Racism, Antiracism, and You**. This is in an incredibly powerful book about dealing with the how and why our country has issues with systemic racism. At times it was painful to listen to, but overwhelmingly eye-opening. If you are interested in a fast-paced history lesson about racism and want to have some moments of self-examination, this book is for you. If you're a middle school and/or high school student and you want to know more about why the Black Lives Matter movement or the issues of racism is important, then this book is for you. This is a book that makes you look both outward at the world around you and inward at your own prejudices, privileges, thoughts and actions.

The next book on my list is **Faith Taking Flight** by Julie Murphy. Faith is a superhero...of sorts. She has the ability to fly and rubs elbows with other superheroes and their super powers, but underneath that, and more importantly than that, she is a regular, over-weight high school girl who volunteers at an animal shelter and has a crush on a classmate; BUT, this isn't really about that either. It is a story that talks about loss and identity. It is a story about learning about when to fit in and when to stand out, and mixes both contemporary realistic fiction and the highly fanciful world of superheroes. It is a great book for those of us who consider ourselves nerds (and maybe romantics!)

Third on my list is **Here in the Real World** by Sara Pennypacker. I picked this book up and the real world melted away. I was caught up in the story of Ware and Jolene almost instantly. Ware is an 11-year-old boy who is shipped off to the Rec Center everyday all summer, much to his dismay. But because he is extremely introverted, and a bit of a misfit, he slinks away one day and lands upon an old torn down church and another misfit, Jolene. The two form an odd friendship and the church becomes their kingdom where they are allowed to be and act the way they want. This book was slightly reminiscent of Bridge to Terabithia for me--which is another personal favorite of mine. Overall, a great read for both middle grade readers (4-8) and also a great choice for a family read aloud.

The two picture books I choose for my top 2020 picks are Swashby at Sea (same as Miss Bree) and **A Polar Bear in the Snow**. A Polar Bear in the Snow, is a fun book. It has unique illustrations made by tearing paper and is a very simple story that the little ones will really appreciate. If you are looking for some picture books to buy the little ones in your life, these two are my top choices for 2020.

Josie's top picks of 2020

- Home Before Dark by Riley Sager
- Follow Me to Ground by Sue Rainsford
- Every Night is Pizza Night by J. Kenji Lopez-Alt

Home Before Dark by Riley Sager was a great spooky read about a supposedly haunted mansion that kept me guessing right up until the very end - and even though it's not autumn or Halloween anymore, this would be a great book to gift to any ghost story lover on your Christmas list! (Plus, the cover glows in the dark, who doesn't love that?)

Another favorite of mine this year, if you're looking for something a little different (it's got that "original, surreal Grimm's fairy tale" kind of vibe going) is **Follow Me to Ground** by Sue Rainsford. A story of otherworldly magic - that of a father and daughter who can heal any illness - and a tale of dangerous love and betrayal, it's sure to keep you wondering as to how its characters are going to end up.

If you've got a kiddo in your life that's needing a good storybook to read this holiday season, I'd definitely recommend **Every Night is Pizza Night** by J. Kenji Lopez-Alt. It's a fun read about a girl named Pipo and her quest to prove that pizza is *the best* food out there, by cooking and trying new meals with her friends and neighbors! It's a story about open-mindedness, community, and family - and it's got a fun pizza recipe right in the back, so you can try cooking Pipo's own best pizza recipe with your own children!
