

THE FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY SHOP

The Friends of the Library Shop on 61 Water Street in Skowhegan was created in early December 2020. Now, just a little over a year later, it has become a favorite place to purchase all types of household items (including books and furniture) both for your own home and for gifts.

Income from sales, (after paying expenses of rent, internet and insurance) has enabled the shop to deposit \$5,000 every three months into the Friends' account. This money has subsequently gone towards purchases for the library such as a 3D Printer, the Children's Reading program, and some of the new library flooring.

All items for sale are donated. Some do not remain in the store, but are occasionally transferred to Library Lawn Sales as new and different donations are received. In both July and December, markdown sales are also held to tempt new and returning buyers. In addition, it must be mentioned that the excellent lighting along with attractive and clever displays in the shop have a great deal to do with successful sales. (Kudos to our wonderful staff!)

The shop's all-volunteer staff at this time includes mainly Karen Lewia, Lynda Quinn and Kirk Karkos. Additional volunteers who would like to consider helping on a regular basis of one- or one-half day each week are invited to contact Karen at the shop. (Telephone: 614 1011).
