LIBRARY DIRECTOR'S CORNER

As we decorated the library for February, I reflected on how many people love the library. Frequently people stop in to look at the building and let us know what the library meant to them as youngsters. I enjoy hearing these stories about favorite books that are still on the shelf or how they "lived" here after school. Some people say the library was their home away from home, or a quiet place where they felt safe and peaceful. Many tell us how much they love the library now. The Skowhegan Free Public Library has been an integral part of this community for 118 years. Can you imagine all the lives that this grand old institution has impacted? It has held a place of respect, dignity and honor. In addition to the books, and other materials in the collection, the library sponsors programs like the recent play, story hours, and the Peace Fleece multi-media event, which culturally enrich our town.

Recently I had to research what materials were used to build the library. I found an article about the library from the Somerset Reporter, January 17, 1889. It described in detail what the library would look like and what materials would be used. It was heartwarming to learn how excited the town was about the construction of the library.

The reporter wrote, "The location of the building is superior. Elm Street with its magnificent river view where the eye sweeps at a glance the 5 miles of the placid Kennebec...is probably the

finest bit of river scenery in Maine." After describing the various rooms the article ended with "The building on this site cannot be otherwise than an elegant one and second to none of its kind in any village in Maine. Our people will take a lively interest in it and be eager for its completion and occupancy."

The building project was contingent upon the citizens agreeing to create a Soldier's Memorial for those who served in the Civil War. The reporter said he was strongly in favor of the proposed memorial and asked that every patriotic man in Skowhegan show his support by voting a reasonable sum of money to carry the plan into effect.

The town did vote their support and the library was built. The library has served this community for over 100 years and it is because the community has loved and supported the library. I would like to say thank you to every one who continues to support this much loved institution.

BOOK REVIEW By Darla L. Pickett

Fish!, is a book about teamwork and improving morale in the workplace.

A very quick read, *Fish!* offers some sound advice on how to introduce a positive spirit into the work environment and boost morale.

The story is told in a very engaging style and uses as evidence of its effectiveness the same theory applied to a fish market in Seattle.

In the fish market, the men learned to do a nasty and often thankless job by integrating joy in the work itself and giving over entirely to making the customer happy. In other words, they introduced fun.

A fictional manager is handed the responsibility of turning a group of sour employees into a good and friendly department by showing them how the fish market did it.

All the ideas -- such as working together to improve customer satisfaction and learning to enjoy fellow workers -- do offer some solutions for making one's workplace happier. It left some room for doubt for me, because one would have to bring all the employees on board to make it work, and that would seem next to impossible.

However, the book is a real treat for showing what could be possible when all people work together for the good of the unit. It demonstrates how a joyful attitude could work to enhance everyone's life if only they would choose it.

Fish! is an excellent read even if a person learns only one tip on how to adjust one's own spirit to make work more fun.

BOOK REVIEW

Hatchet by Gary Paulson is an excellent book for adventurous young boys. It tells about a thirteen-year-old who flew off to spend the summer with his father in the north woods. Unfortunately, the pilot died and the plane crashed into a lake. Somehow the boy escaped the plane and swam to shore. The rest of the story relates how he survived, with only a hatchet, for nearly two months alone in the wilderness.

This book was located in the young readers section of Borders where I searched for a birthday gift. Of course, I had to read it, too. And I was fascinated. I learned a lot of facts that could be incorporated into a book that I am writing about a cave girl!
