

We have played with clay, built magic wands, concocted and bottled spells, and built haunted houses and spooky monsters with blocks.

We have some really interesting programs coming up in November!

The first of which on November 7th, the Write ME Epistolary Poetry Workshop with author and former Maine Poet Laureate, Wesley McNair. In this workshop, participants will choose one of five letter-poems as an inspiration for writing their own in-class poem.

What is an epistolary poem you ask?

An epistolary poem is a poem that is also a letter. The epistolary poem remains a powerful and captivating poetic form—and one that seems particularly crucial to our present moment, in which the intimacy, community-building, and grounding, physical aspects of letter writing can provide us with much-needed antidotes for social polarization and isolation. Julia Bouwsma, Maine's Poet Laureate, has created a Maine-wide epistolary poetry project that:


- 1) introduces the form through a series of 20+ free public workshops across the state and then
- 2) pairs up participating individuals as "poetry pen pals" to communicate with one another over a period of months. Simply put, this project will pair together people in different parts of Maine to exchange letter poems. This project is open to anyone who lives in Maine (or is connected to the state) and is ages 18+.

We are thrilled to have creator and host of Murder, She Told podcast Kristen Seavey at the library on November 14th as she talks about her advocacy work, podcast and some of the lesser known cases and crimes that have left a dark spot on our home state of Maine and New England. Murder, She Told is a true crime podcast shedding light on the cold cases and unsolved murders, missing persons, and crime stories that often get overlooked from Maine, New England, and small towns from away. Rooted in deep research, straightforward narratives, and the victims and their family at the center of every story, Murder, She Told will speak to any listener no matter where they call home. Join victim's advocate and central Mainer, Kristen Seavey, and explore the dark underbelly of the safest places in America, where everybody knows everyone, and bad things never happen... Murder, She Told seeks to help the people who remain without answers.

This is the story of a serial killer. A stolen child. Revenge. Death. And an ordinary house at the end of an ordinary street.


All these things are true. And yet they are all lies...

You think you know what's inside the last house on Needless Street. You think you've read this story before. That's where you're wrong.




Gabrielle - The Millicent Quibb School of Etiquette for Young Ladies of Mad Science by Kate McKinnon

Bree - Buried in Maine by Arend Thibodeau

This book explores cemeteries that have hosted the departed since the early colonization of Maine. Hand-carved angels of death, thoughtful epitaphs, and even intrigue surround these old and unique burial sites. We also visit infamous grave sites such as the Jonathan Buck memorial in Bucksport. Buck, a forefather of the town of Bucksport, allegedly had a curse placed upon him by a condemned witch, as the book will explore.



Lydia - Game of Thrones by George R. R. Martin

Sweeping from a harsh land of cold to a summertime kingdom of epicurean plenty, A Game of Thrones tells a tale of lords and ladies, soldiers and sorcerers, assassins and bastards, who come together in a time of grim omens. Amid plots and counter-plots, tragedy and betrayal, victory and terror, allies and enemies, the fate of the Starks hangs perilously in the balance, as each side endeavors to win that deadliest of conflicts: the game of thrones.



Nikki - Horror Movie by Paul Tremblay

In June 1993, a group of young guerilla filmmakers spent four weeks making Horror Movie, a notorious, disturbing, art-house horror flick.

The weird part? Only three of the film's scenes were ever released to the public, but Horror Movie has nevertheless grown a rabid fanbase. Three decades later, Hollywood is pushing for a big budget reboot.

But at what cost?

Horror Movie is an obsessive, psychologically chilling, and suspenseful twist on the "cursed film" that breathlessly builds to an unforgettable, mind-bending conclusion.
